The parable of the king's wedding banquet: "Tell those invited: 'Behold, I have prepared my banquet, my calves and fattened cattle are killed, and everything is ready; come to the feast.'"

"But when the king came in to meet the guests, he saw a man there not dressed in a wedding garment. The king said to him, 'My friend how is it that you came in here without a wedding garment?' But he was reduced to silence." *Matthew 22: 1-14*

### 'Thrift Store Saints'

Fifteen years ago, Jane Knuth, a math teacher and mom, began volunteering at the St. Vincent de Paul thrift shop in Kalamazoo, Michigan. She approached the work with typical baby-boomer hard-charging determination to "fix the world" — but over the years, the experience changed *her*. The poor and desperate she has been able to help have deepened her own faith and brought her to a new understanding of what it means to be a disciple of Jesus.

Jane Knuth has collected stories of her experiences at "St. Vinnie's" in a delightful new book **Thrift Store Saints: Meeting Jesus 25c at a Time**. **Thrift Store Saints** includes some two dozen stories about the volunteers and patrons of the St. Vincent's thrift shop. The Kalamazoo thrift store sells everything from furniture and clothing to basic household items, but also offers financial assistance, referral services — and prayerful and emotional support — to the needy and lost.

Rather than viewing society's poor as problems to be solved, Jane and her colleagues see them each in a completely different light: as saints who can lead us straight to the heart of Christ. Jane Knuth writes:

"From all appearances, it looks as if we are running a thrift store at St. Vincent de Paul. At our meetings we frequently get into discussions about how to better run the store. Should we raise our prices? Give away less? Not accept so many donations? Lock our dumpster? Move to a better retail location? All these issues would come up with any resale shop. Eventually, it occurs to us that our purpose is not to run the most profitable, shrewd, efficient, riff-raff-free store in town. Our purpose is to help the poor and to change our way of thinking and being. It only *looks* as though we run a store. The store is just our cover . . .

"I still keep looking for the 'deserving poor' — the innocent ones who are blatant victims of injustice and hard luck. I want to help them and no one else. From what I can see, apart from children, most poor people's situations seem to stem from a mixture of uncontrollable circumstances, luck, and their own decisions. Same as my situation. Do I deserve everything I have? Am I somehow more moral, smarter, or a harder worker than poor people? Sometimes I am, most times I'm not. Do poor people deserve their daily struggle for existence? Are they immoral, stupid, and lazy? Sometimes they are, most times they aren't."

God's image of his human family is realized in the kindness and charity extended by a small thrift store. In Matthew's wedding garment story, Jesus articulates the Father's vision for humanity: a "banquet" at which all are respected and honored for who they are and the goodness they bring to the king's table, be it the "table" of the classroom, the clinic, the playground, the home. If we are to be truly faithful to God's vision, the compassion of God must transform our heart's perspective, enabling us to see beyond ethnic stereotypes, economic distinctions, class and celebrity, to recognize every man, woman and child as made in the same image and likeness of God in which we were all created; we must be willing both to give joyfully what we have and to accept humbly what others bring to the table. God's "banquet" is only realized when we embrace a radically new vision of humanity, a perspective that ignores suspicions, doubts and stereotypes and, instead, recognizes everyone, first, as a child of God, worthy of respect, love and compassion.

**'That face, that face, that fabulous face . . . '**

Remember when your mom would say, "Stop making that face or it will freeze that way forever!"?

There may be something to that.

We humans are responsible for our own faces. Think about it: We are pretty much born without a face. When a baby is born, cute and adorable as the child may be, the newborn's face exhibits very little in the way of individuality (sorry, Moms). A baby's face tells little about the child's personality and gives no indication of the kind of character the child will develop into. A baby's beauty depends entirely on its genetic endowment.

But with each day and week and year of the child's life, the face changes. It takes on its own "look," reflecting the child's growth and development and emerging personality. It all culminates at the age of forty when, finally, a person has the essential lines of his or her "own" face. From forty onward, our faces manifest individuality, character, and a beauty-beyond-genes.

What is important about all of this is what, in the end, forms our faces. Up until the age of forty, genetics is dominant in how we look (we can be a jerk and still look beautiful). But from middle-age on, we look like what we believe in: If I am anxious, petty, selfish, bitter, narrow and self-centered, my face will show it. Conversely, if I am warm, gracious, humble, and other-centered, my face will also show it.

There are no poker faces after the age of forty.

The philosopher Jean-Paul Sartre suggested that human beings create their own faces. In the parable of the wedding garment, Jesus suggests the same idea: Our lives are composed of pieces of fabric that we struggle to sew and piece together to make a garment fitting to wear at God's wedding banquet. This garment, like the making of our own faces, is "fitted" from our hurts, fears and pain; they mirror our joys, triumphs and the re-discovery of how loved we are by God. God's invitation to his banquet should fill us with hope despite the obstacles we encounter on the way to the banquet of heaven; making our lives a fitting garment for that banquet should give us a sense of direction and meaning to our days as we make our way to God's wedding feast.

## Pastor Chip to teach a class on C.S. Lewis' *Miracles*

Do miracles really happen? Can we know if the supernatural world exists? "The central miracle asserted by Christians is the Incarnation. They say that God became Man. Every other miracle prepares the way for this, or results from this." This is the key idea of *Miracles*, in which C.S. Lewis shows that a Christian must not only accept but rejoice in miracles as a testimony of the unique personal involvement of God in creation. Using his characteristic warmth, lucidity, and wit, Lewis challenges the rationalists and cynics who are mired in their lack of imagination and provides a poetic and joyous affirmation that miracles really do occur in our everyday lives.

**The Movie "Shadowlands"**

Shadowlands tells the true story of the love affair between novelist and noted Christian scholar C.S. Lewis and a Jewish-American poet. [Anthony Hopkins](#) stars as C.S. "Jack" Lewis, an Oxford professor and successful author of the Chronicles of Narnia series of children's fantasy novels. A confirmed bachelor, Jack's existence is an inward life of the mind. Somewhat detached from the world, his only social outlet is evenings out at a local pub discussing philosophy and religion with his fellow lecturers. Jack has been corresponding with a bluntly intelligent American woman, Joy Gresham ([Debra Winger](#)), who arrives to visit him, with her young son Douglas in tow. She tells Jack that she has actually fled from an abusive marriage and plans to divorce, and Jack astonishes friends and family by agreeing to a platonic marriage with Joy so that she can obtain British citizenship. As their friendship deepens and Joy discovers that she has a terminal illness, the relationship between Joy and Jack becomes a genuine romance, and their marriage turns into a real commitment.

## Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd Council Meetings

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September 15, 2011 meeting

**Little Lambs:** There are currently 29 VPK students enrolled, which is the maximum VPK students we can enroll. The overall enrollment total is 68 students.

The first classroom in the Little Lambs wing will be available for a Nursery during Sunday Worship. A speaker will be installed in that room to pipe in the Worship Service. Bob Austin and Gus Dueben will be installing the wiring and speaker system which was donated Gus & Helene Dueben.

Pastor Chip said he would be contacting prospective staffing volunteers for the Nursery.

**Finance:** Currently, there is only \$6600 of total funds available in reserves. The Council passed a motion that if it became necessary, that finance could take needed funds out of the \$100,000 CD to cover any necessary expenses.

### **Old Business:**

1. IRS audit is closed on all items, and we are just awaiting the final report from the IRS auditor..
2. Worship and Music reported that there are currently 5 candidates. Interviews will held on Thursday 22<sup>nd</sup> and Sat 24<sup>th</sup>
3. Security system for the Gardeners shed is on hold.
4. Randy Hendricks said that he would complete the repairs on the Walkway Fascia at no cost to the church.
5. Chuck reported that the Oak tree in the Court Yard needs to be trimmed. There are many dead limbs that could fall at anytime as well as many limbs touching the roof. Insurance companies have stated that limbs have to be at least 7 ft. above roofs or claims could be denied.
6. Copier Lawsuit results: Their lawyer didn't come up with proof of title so the Judge dismissed the suit, but did say that if they came up the proof they could reopen the suit. Our lawyer recommended that we wait it out, which what we will do.

### **New Business:**

1. Randy Hendricks submitted his resignation from the Council effective immediately. The Council accepted it with regrets. Pastor will contact Barbara Chaparro, who is the last elected alternate to verify that she will fill the balance of Randy's term (ending May, 2012).
2. Mike Williams will head up a fundraising advisory committee- meeting probably on quarterly bases to help with raising money for individual committees. WELCA is planning to have a rummage sale in the Spring.
3. The Kitchen air conditioner is not functioning and Chuck will have Bob Austin investigate this issue. There was a possible lighting strike that disabled it.
4. The Youth committee requested a loan to cover the balance needed to purchase their pumpkins for their annual fund drive. It was approved with the request to pay back ASAP. It most likely will be paid back within two weeks of the sales campaign.

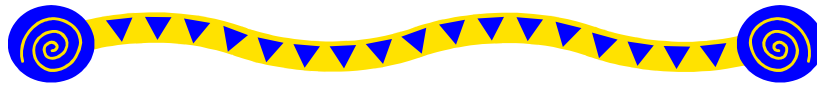
Members and Friends of Good Shepherd Church:

Now I am undergoing a twelve week series of chemo and hopefully will be out and about after that. In the meantime, I would appreciate your continued prayers.

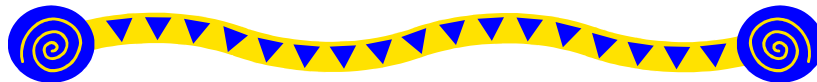

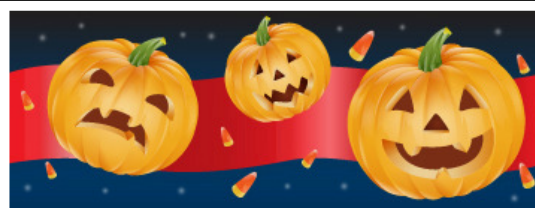

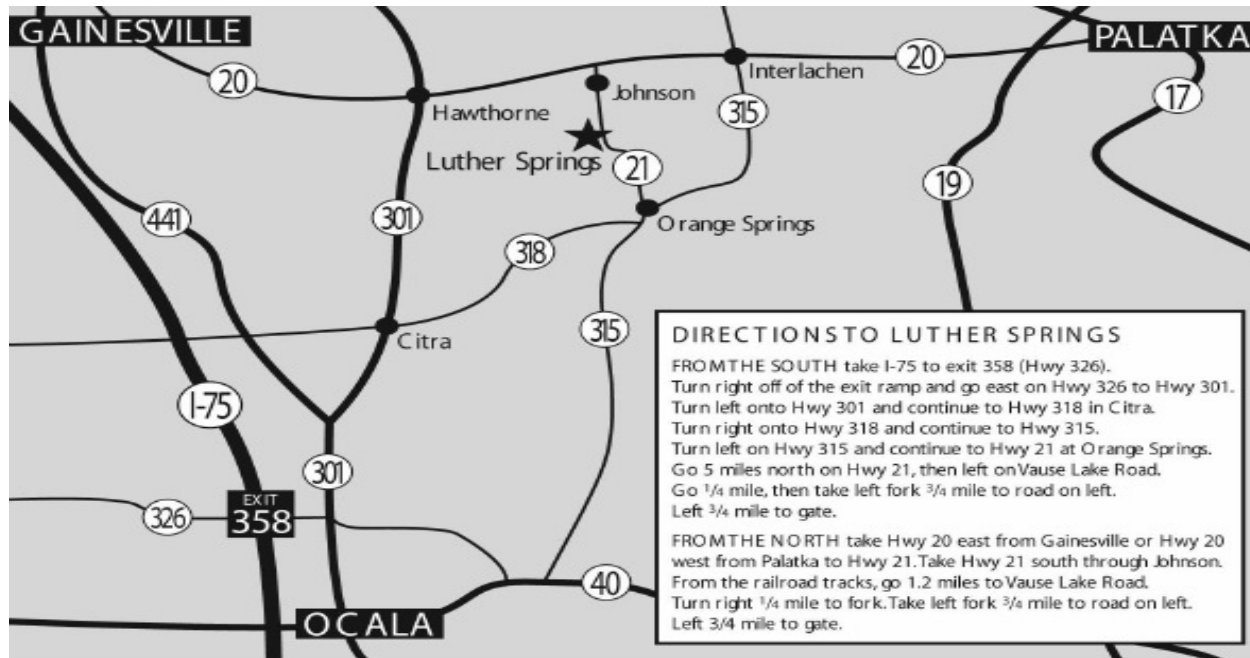
